Virginia Bounty-Land Application of Larkin Beasley VAS1073

Corporation of Fredericksburg SS.

Came LeRoy Beazley before me one of the Justices of the Peace for the said Corporation and made Oath that Larkin Beazley his Brother enlisted as a Soldier in the Continental line for three years or during the war, that his Brother the said Larkin Beazley was killed in the time of his service or died, that he the said LeRoy Beazley is the Legal Heir of the said Larkin Beazley and of right is entitled to the Land granted the Soldiers under Continental establishment, that his brother went from the County of Essex in the State of Virginia, Certified under my hand this twenty-third day of April 1786.

Larkin Beasley of the 7<sup>th</sup> Regiment was killed by accident the 1<sup>st</sup> of August 1778 but when he enlisted I do not know but I recollect that he was a substitute & joined the Army early in the spring of 1778 & was in Colo. Jno. Webb's [John Webb's] Company
