Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indcipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

Mathews County Court December 14th, 1818

This day came Conquest Royster into open court and according to due form of law made oath that Francis Jarvis did serve as a fellow soldier with him in the 2nd Virginia Regiment of the State line of Virginia in the Northern Army commanded by Colonels William Brent and Charles Dabney in General Muhlenberg's Regiment for the full Term of his enlistment, which was for and during the term of three years, and that the said Francis Jarvis did obtain an Honorable discharge from the service from under the signatures of the said Colonels Charles Dabney and William Brent.
