Virginia Pension Claim of Alexander Bonny (Bonnell) VAS1222

Alexander Bonnell was rec'd as one of the new levies in 1779. He marchd with my Bata'n to Charlestown [Charleston SC] in the same year – but as it was [illegible word] to [illegible word] under command of [illegible name or initials] Wallace I do not recollect [illegible word] the circumstances of the waggons running over his legs – but I have little doubt of the truth of the same.

I do with the advice of the Council hereby Certify that Alexander Bonny alias Bonnell about 60 years of age late a private in the detachment of the Virginia Line commanded by Col'n. Heth, was disabled in the service of the United States by the wheel of a waggon runing over his leg. And that he is allowed the sum of Ten pounds yearly, to commence from the first day of January 1786.

Given under my hand as Lieutenant Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the Governor being absent) at Richmond the 11<sup>th</sup> of August 1787.

On application of Alexander Bonny a pensioner residing in this County, It is Ordered that the Sheriff pay him Ten pounds, the sum appearing to be due to the said Bonny on the first day of January last, by a Certificate produced to the Court, which upon comparing with the List transmitted from the Auditor is found to be right
