On Examination of John McClanahan who appears to be about thirty years of age * the right Leg has had the Tibia shattered & broken to pieces in a very great * & from the loss of Bone, the Leg has become quite crooked & almost use* to which misfortune a remaining cario* still continues from the op* of the ulceration now on the Leg, & which * has ever been the case * the first receipt of Injury – am well satisfied he is disabled from supporting himself by hard Labour only & that his sufferings must have been * indeed
3rd March 1788 * Foushee

I do with the advice of the Council hereby certify that John McClanahan aged about 30 years, late a private in a detachment of the Virginia Line commanded by Lieut Colo. Campbell whose pay was at the rate of £24 per annum, was disabled in the service of the United states by a wound in his right leg; and that he is allowed the sum of Twelve pounds yearly, to commence from the 1st day of January 1786.
