Virginia documents pertaining to Philip Savidge VAS2111

I DO with the advice of the Council hereby certify, that Mourning Savidge, widow of Philip Savidge who was a private in the 4th Virginia Regiment and died in the service of The United States is entitled to the sum of Eight Pounds yearly; which allowance is to commence from the first day of January 1787.

GIVEN under my hand as Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, at Richmond, this 7th day of March 1787

Mourning Savidge widow of Philip Savidge who was a Soldier in the fourth Virginia Regiment on Continental Establishment, personally came into Court and produced a Certificate from the Executive for an allowance of Eight pounds pr Annum, she made oath that she is the person named in the said Certificate and is the proper claimant whereupon it is ordered that the Sheriff of this County do pay to the said Mourning Savidge the said Sum of Eight pounds out of the money he may collect from Taxes.
