


Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

These are to Certify that William Allman has served in the navy of this State three [undeciphered word] as gunner under my Command Given under my hand this [?]th July
Jas Barron [James Barron]/ Com'd S N [Commodore State Navy]


I do impower Mr [undeciphered name] to get my land warrant [two or three undeciphered words]
October 14 1782




To the Executive of Virginia the heirs of Wm Alman who was a Gunner in this States Navy in the Revolution, represent

That they have never rec'd all the Land Bounty to which they are entitled in consideration of the services of their ancestor. They file herewith the Register's certificate that Wm. Alman rec'd a warrant for 200 acres & ask of the Executive to allow them Land Bounty to which a Gunner in the state has [been?] entitled Jany 12th 1832

I certify that William Alman served with me in the Virginia Navy three years successively in the Revolutionary war [James Burk, pension application S6649]
[Elizabeth City, 21 June 1832]



I certify that I served on board the Boat Patriot of which I was Gunner for three years towit 1778 - 9 - & 80 I also certify that the usual term of inlistment on board of the Virginia Vessels was for three years, and none less than three years to my knowledge. I know this was the case with respect to the Boats Patriot and Liberty, commanded by the two Barrons [Commodore James Barron, Sr. (VAS1949) and Commodore James Barron, Jr. (W12264)]. I can further state that there was never a disertion from these two vessels while I was attached to them, nor do I know that any officer or seaman was dishonourably discharged from either of those vessels I further state that those officers who were on board while I was, served three years sucessively
[Elizabeth City, 21 June 1832]



NOTE: A note initialed by Gov. John Floyd indicates that the heirs' claim for additional land was rejected on 1 May 1832.
