No'ampton [Northampton] County No Carolina Oct'r 10th 1826

This is to Certify that John Mundrel [probably John Mundell (Mundle) R7490] appeared before me one of the Justices of the Peace of s'd County and maketh oath that he was acquainted with & knew Thomas Bass – that he was raised in the County of S'ampton [Southampton] (Va) and lived there; that he the s'd Thomas Bass enlisted during the Revolutionary War for the term of Three years under a Captain Moore his Christian name not recollected [Francis Moore BLWt1081-400] that he was marched from thence to the South and further he knoweth not. – Given under my hand & Seal the above date

Brunswick County Virginia To wit

This day Partin Bass Came before me Nath'l E. Mabry one of the Commonwealths Justices of the peace for the aforesaid County and made Oath that he was well Acquainted with Thomas Bass and that he the said Thomas Bass was raised in the County of Southampton Virginia and lived in the said County at the time of the Revolutionary war that the said Thomas Bass Inlisted for Three years Service under Capt. Frank Moore to go to the South that he did go he well Recollects and Returned and Died in the County of Brunswick leaving several Children Francis Bass James Bass & Others
Given under my hand and Seal this 9th February 1827

Percivals Va 7th August 1828

Gentlemen The enclosed affidavits will go to prove that our father Thomas Bass was a Soldier of the Revolution. We have been advised that the state of Virginia owes us (he being long since dead) his bounty land Will you be pleased to enclose by mail an Order in council for it. Direct to Percivals post Office Va
Your Obt Servts Francis Bass for himself & brothers sisters

[several undeciphered words] Certify that Thomas Bass enlisted in Revolutionary War under Captain Francis Moore in County of Southampton and served his full time therein and was Honorably discharged
Given under our hands this [1st] day of Feb'ry 1831
