


Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

Virginia documents pertaining to Alleck Saunders VAS2453

The Affidavit of Thomas Sandy [VAS2452] and Lawrence Beddoe [VAS2451], the former aged about fifty and the latter aged about fifty years Citizens of the Commonwealth of Virginia and residents of the County of Richmond in the said Commonwealth of Virginia, Taken this day at Westmoreland Court House before us the subscribers Justices of the peace in and for the said County of Westmoreland in the Commonwealth aforesaid. The said Affiants being first sworn according to Law, say they have been well acquainted with Alleck Saunders ever since the 28<sup>th</sup> day of February in the year 1778 at which time or nearly about which time, he the said Alleck Saunders inlisted as a Soldier under John Mazarett [R16059] Captain of Artillery in a Company raised in the lower Counties of the Nothern Neck of Virginia, and Continued in the service in the state of Virginia, as a Soldier in the Revolutionary War between Great Brittain, And America for three years at least, and that he was never out of the service as a soldier from the time of inlistment till his discharge, That the said Alleck Saunders is and always has been a Citizen of the state of Virginia, and was born in the County of Richmond aforesaid and now resides in Westmoreland aforesaid. that about the 26<sup>th</sup> or 28<sup>th</sup> of February 1781 the said Alleck Saunders obtained his discharge from the service aforesaid from Capt. Christopher Roan [sic: Christopher Roane X635] at the City of Richmond.

Westmoreland County, To wit.

Alleck Saunders this day Came before us Justices of the Commonwealth of Virginia in the County afore'd and made Oath that he never Received Any Land for his services as a Soldier. That he has either lost or mislaid his discharge and that he knows of no Officer (now living) under whome he served – given under Our hands this 30<sup>th</sup> May 1812.
