State Pension Application of William Hogan VAS27

On Examination of William Hogan a Pensioner find he has received a number of wounds most of which appear to have been dangerous – that he has lost the left arm from a little below the Shoulder & has a just Claim to Support from the Public, being disabled greatly. W. Foushee/ December 21st 1780

The bearer Wm. Hogan who was returned a Soldier in my Regiment to serve 18 months his time of service commenced the 25 Ap'l. 1779 he having served his full time is hereby discharged Given under my hand this 25 Nov. '83 A. Buford Colo.

I DO, with the advice of Council, hereby certify, that Wm. Hogan, about 26 years of age late a private in the Detachment of the Virg'a. Line commanded by Col'n. Buford appears to have been disabled in such a manner while in the service of the United States as to entitle him to the sum of Eighteen pounds years; which allowance is accordingly made him, to commence from the first day of January 1786.

Given under my Hand, as Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia, at Richmond, this 22^d day of December 1786.

NOTE: It is probable that Hogan was wounded at the defeat of Col. Abraham Buford at the Battle of Waxhaws SC on 28 May 1780.

Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

the first day of January 1786.

Court is still continued which is ordered to be certified.


