I do hereby Certify that on or about the 18<sup>th</sup> day of July in the year 1775 Doct'r Humphrey Fullerton went with my Company of Regular troops as a Surgeon and remained in that Capacity until we arrived at Cambridge [MA] which place I left of the 11<sup>th</sup> September in the same year being detached for Quebeck [sic: Quebec, Canada] where I was taken a prisoner [1 Jan 1776] and the said Humphrey Fullerton being then sick he remained at Cambridge some time after which I have been Informed and believe the said Humphrey Fullerton joined another department of the Army (engaged in the late war between America and Great Britain, and marched to Fort Washington, where he remained until the 16<sup>th</sup> Nov'r. 1776 when he was taken a prisoner, that he remained a prisoner about nineteen Months and Died such, without being exchanged. Certified under my hand at Winchester the 20<sup>th</sup> day of November 1800.
