Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do hereby certify that I have been informed and believe that George Nowell, enlisted under Captain Spotswood Dandridge that he enlisted to serve during the War and that I have also been informed and believe that he obtained a Commission of cornet. Given under my hand this 2<sup>nd</sup> February 1810

This day Josiah Wingfield personally appeared and made Oath before me that George Nowell enlisted in the Cavalry service, in the Virginia Troop commanded by Captain Spotswood Dandridge, that he served as Sergeant under the Continental establishment and was promoted to [paper damaged and text illegible] and served to the Conclusion of the [paper damaged, text illegible] in South Carolina without issue, his father mother brother and sister being all dead except his brother Henry Nowell he is the only heir, and entitled to his pay for his revolutionary services. Given under my hand this 15<sup>th</sup> day of January 1810

Amherst County Sct. This day Archilus Mitchell<sup>1</sup> personally appeared and made oath before me a Justice of the Peace for said County That John Nowell enlisted in the Virginia service upon Continental establishment under Captain Clough Shelton, and that he served as Sergeant to the end of the War, that Henry Nowell his brother is the only surviving Brother or sister and his father & mother being dead, he is entitled to his pay and bounty land for his revolutionary services. Given under my hand the 15<sup>th</sup> day of January 1810

I do hereby certify from information from a variety of quarters, that I have good reason to believe that John Nowell who enlisted under Captain Clough Shelton enlisted to serve during the War. Given under my hand this 2<sup>nd</sup> day of February 1810
