Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." King and Queen County Court October 14th 1811

Anthony Hart¹ made oath that he served as a private in Captain Gregory Smith's company in the 7th Virginia Continental Regiment for two years, that Richard Nunn and James Nunn enlisted about the year 1776 in the same Company, that Richard Nunn died while he was in the Army and that James Nunn served the said two years, and John Hoskins made oath that the said Richard Nunn and James Nunn enlisted in the said Gregory Smith's company in the 7th Virginia Continental Regiment, that from report he believed Richard Nunn died in the Army and that James Nunn served his tour and returned to the County of King and Queen.

Certify to the best of my recollection that in the latter end of the year 1775 or beginning of the year 1776 as a Sergt. To Captain Gregory Smith's Company of the 7th Regiment of Continental troops that Richard & James Nunn in said Company & I think for the term of three years. Given under my hand the 8th of October 1811
