At a Court held for Norfolk County the 19th day of November 1811
John Brooks [VAS2682] here in Court made oath that Timothy Wood formerly of Norfolk County who
died about the year Eighteen hundred and five, was a Soldier in the Second Virginia State Regiment in the
Revolutionary War; and that he served during the war, which is ordered to be Certified

At a Court held for norfolk County 15 Nov'r 1830
The Court doth certify upon satisfactory evidence that Timothy Wood served as a private Soldier
in Capt Wm Grimes [William Grimes VAS1713] Company three years in the united states service in the
War of the Revolution.

Virginia Norfolk County to wit.

This day William Crukman personally appeared before me One of the Commonwealths Justices
of the peace for the County aforesaid, and made oath, that he was well acquainted with Timothy Wood,
that they enter'd into the service of the United together during the revolutionary War, and that the said
Timothy Wood continued in the service of the United States as much as three years as a private Soldier in
Capt. William Grimes Company; and that the present James Wood and Nancy Crukmore[?], are the only
children of the said Timothy Wood. Given under my hand & seal as Justice of the peace for the County
aforesaid this 27th day of October 1831. T. Webb JP

1833 June 17 Rejected

NOTE: It is possible that the bounty-land and rejected claim records are for two different soldiers from
Norfolk named Timothy Wood. Capt. William Grimes was in the 15th Virginia Continental Regiment, not
the 2nd Virginia State Regiment.
