At a Court held for James City County June the 12<sup>th</sup> 1780 a Certificate from Colo. J. Allison [John Allison W4112] of Charles Woodward's having served as a Soldier three years in the first State Regiment, the Term of his Enlistment, And another Certificate from Sam'l. Griffin a Justice of James City County of the said Woodward's having made Oath before him, that he never before proved or claimed his Right to Land for his said Military service were produced & read & ordered to be certified & recorded

At a Court held for Norfolk County, the 20<sup>th</sup> day of May 1822.

To all whom it doth or may concern, be it known, that it hath been made satisfactorily to appear to the court, that Charles Woodward was a private in Capt Hoffler's [William Hoffler S38047] Company, in Colo. George Gibsons [George Gibson BLWt1985-500] Regiment on the Virginia Continental line, in the Revolutionary war; that he served as a private for three years, that he has since died, leaving one daughter, his only legitimate heir at Law, who in now the wife of William Taylor, which is ordered to be certified to the proper authority

To the Governor of Virginia

The petition of Lovey Taylor heiress of Charles Woodward respectfully states.

The her ancestor was a soldier in Capt. Hofflers Company in Col. Geo. Gibsons regiment, during the revolution and served for the Space of three years, the time for which he was enlisted. That he has never rec'd. the Bounty in Land which was promised to him at the time of his enlistment. She now is in indigent Circumstances respectfully begs of your Excellency the small quantity of land which his father became entitled to in consideration of his Services.
