

Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do Certify that James McClougklyn [sic] a soldier in Colonel Armons [Charles **Armand** Tuffin, Marquis de la Rouerie] Legionary Corps for three years at Winchester in Virginia sometime in the fall 1782 that he was Discharge at York Town, Pennsylvania at the Close of the Revolutionary War at the period when the said Corps was disbanded and that he was at that time he enlisted a Citizen of Virginia given under my hand this 9th day April 1800





I do Certify that James McGlochlin [sic] Enlisted as a soldier in the Legionary Corps commanded by Colonel Armand of the late Continental Army at Winchester in 1782 for three years, and that he was discharged in York Town Pennsylvania about the 15th of November 1783 at the period of the dissolution of the said Corps and believe him to have been a Citizen of Virginia at the time he enlisted, but of this I am not Certain.
