

Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do hereby certify that I was well acquainted with Ensign Jeremiah Morgan who entered the Army as an Ensign sometime in the year 1786 [sic] and he continued in some command as such during the revolutionary war against Great Britain the reason I was so well acquainted with said Morgan he belonged to the same Regiment that I'd the head it being the 13th Virginia Regiment under Continental establishment.

At a Court held for Mason County on Monday the 16th day of January 1820

"Daniel Morgan came into Court and proved that Armistead H Morgan and Susanna Fike late Susanna Morgan, who is the present wife of Elijah Fike are the reputed children and only children and heirs at law of Jeremiah Morgan deceased an officer in the Revolutionary War and the reputed Brother of General Simon Morgan deceased; which is ordered to be certified to the Secretary of War."

In testimony whereof I have hereunto put my hand and affixed the seal of the said County the 18th day of January in the year 1820.
