

PRISONERS OF WAR FROM THE SIEGE OF CHARLESTON AND THE BATTLE OF CAMDEN
WHO JOINED THE BRITISH IN THE DUKE OF CUMBERLAND'S REGIMENT

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INTRODUCTION

On 12 May 1780, after being besieged for more than a month, Gen. Benjamin Lincoln surrendered the city of Charleston, South Carolina, and virtually the entire army of the South. While militia troops were released on parole (promise not to take up arms again unless exchanged), the 2500 Continental soldiers from Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia were marched into the American barracks as prisoners of war. They were allowed to walk about town, however, and about 500 of the American POWs escaped.² The British were so offended by this perceived breach of the terms of capitulation that in September they transferred many of the prisoners into the holds of six prison ships in Charleston Harbor – the *Esk*, *Fidelity*, *King George*, *Success-Increase*, *Concord*, and *Two Sisters*. Joining them were Maryland and Delaware Continentals captured at the Battle of Camden on 16 August 1780.

The prisoners, as young as 13 and as old as 49, were kept in appalling conditions aboard the ships. On 26 October Col. Nisbet Balfour, the British commandant at Charleston, reported that, “the rebel Prisoners die faster, even than, they used to desert.”³ Donald Sellers described the conditions that led to the high rate of mortality, blaming not only the British but the Continental Congress:

[Gen. Henry Clinton] ordered a stronger prison to be got ready Such as prison Ships to be moored in the center of Cooper River and such a severe prison was more than what I was able to stand Being at the same time without Money and Clothes eating up with lice and rotton with dirt I laid down at night the same as I walked about all day neither Blankets nor anything But the hard boards to rest upon And now if Congress had fulfilled their promise to me and had payed me my wages and Clothes as I was promised then, I would have been clothed as Soldier and payed every month. I might then been able to stand the hardship of the prison being so severe as it was But to the best of my knowledge I never received pay or Clothing for the space of three year⁴

Providing even meager supplies to the American prisoners was a great expense, so on 17 November 1780 Balfour gladly authorized Lord Charles Greville Montagu (1741-1784) to take 500 of them off his hands by enlisting them to fight for the British in the West Indies. Montagu, who had been a Royal Governor of the colony of South Carolina and was then a captain on the Island of Jamaica, was allowed to recruit five

companies of 100 men each into a corps to be called the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment of Carolina Rangers, even though it would include soldiers from other states, especially Virginia.⁵ The former POWs would not have to fight other Americans, but would instead be sent to Jamaica to oppose French and Spanish forces allied with America. They would be a provincial corps, receiving the same bounty, pay, and clothing as British regulars. In addition, the recruits were promised land after the war either in America or Jamaica. An advertisement published in Charleston in February 1781 even held out the prospect of gold and silver from a conquered Spain.⁶ It must have sounded enticing when it was read to the prisoners in the dark, damp, frigid holds surrounded by filth and dying comrades. The ad read in part:

The prisoner may now gain his freedom, and those who had fortunes, and have lost them, may have an opportunity of acquiring new ones; whilst such who never possessed any may line their pockets with Spanish gold, by enlisting for three years in his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment of American Rangers, intended to be raised and commanded by the Right Hon. Lord Charles MONTAGU, to fight against the enemies of King George the Third in the West Indies, and on the Spanish territories, a country rich in mines of gold and silver.

In early February 1781 Capt. Montagu arrived in Charleston and soon after braved the stench and pestilence in the prison ships to recruit. By his own account he was not warmly received.

They appeared at first obstinately sullen, and would scarcely give an answer, whilst others not withstanding their long confinement, declared, tho they had little hopes of being exchanged, that, as they had fought in a cause that appeared to them a just one, no hardships should compell them to desert that, nor no advantage tempt them to engage in any other.⁷

Gradually, however, hope faded, Montagu persisted, and his offer became one many POWs couldn't refuse. One was Donald Sellers quoted above, and another was David Bradley:

I lay 11 months in the hulks at Charleston, when finding our situation intolerable from filth &c and seeing no prospect of being exchanged, and conceiving ourselves neglected by our country, a number of us were induced in order to get out of prison to enter the British Service under the express stipulation of not bearing arms against our countrymen in America, our Oath was to serve his Brittanic Majesty on the Spanish Main for 3 years only. I was thus driven from my country by circumstances over which I had no controul.⁸

Many continued to resist, however, and the British had to resort to other means of persuasion:

Ransom Savage a Sergeant in the second Continental Regiment of North Carolina, being sworn on the holy Evangelists of Almighty God, deposeth and saith, that early in March

last [1781], he being then a Prisoner of War on board the British Prison Ship, Success Increase, lying in Charles Town Harbour, a certain Serjeant Brown came on board said Ship with a number of Captains of Transports, and immediately ordered all the Prisoners on deck, when said Brown desired the Captains to make choice of such men as they liked, which they did; that on one of the mens refusing to go, the said Serjeant caned and kicked him very severely, and forced him, with a number of others, into the Boats; that the prisoners were told by said, Brown, they must either enlist in Lord Charles Montagu's Corps, going to Jamaica, or will be impressed on board Men of War⁹

Montagu succeeded in recruiting approximately 500 American POWs, who were taken out of the holds and returned to the barracks and to hospitals to recover their health and await transport to Jamaica. Eight blacks, possibly freed slaves, also joined the regiment as Black Pioneers. Each man went from being practically naked to receiving "1 split shirt, 1 pair overalls, 1 pair buckles, 1 pair shoes, 1 blanket, 1 block stock, 1 hair comb, and 1 small tooth comb to a mess."¹⁰ They left Charleston on May 24 and did not arrive at Fort Augusta, Jamaica, until August 18. During the same period British and American negotiators arranged for the 740 remaining American prisoners in Charleston to be exchanged. The final "cartel" was agreed to at Claudius Pegue's Plantation near Cheraw SC on 3 May 1781, and the surviving prisoners were freed at Jamestown, Virginia, in August.

In Jamaica the erstwhile rebels earned high praise from their newly promoted commander, Lieutenant Colonel Lord Charles Montagu.

The men are young and hardy, patient of fatigue and not murmuring if they meet with hardships; the courage of a great part of them has been tried and approved. They are free of complaints or disorders, except such as maybe the consequences of a long confinement on board Ships, Salt Provisions and bad Water, from all which they would soon recover, could any means be fallen upon to supply them with fresh provisions. These Men, and their officers, are now only anxious to be ordered on Service, that they may have an opportunity of again trying their Courage and proving their zeal and attachment to the cause they have espoused, and I flatter myself his Majesty will not find more faithful subjects.¹¹

Governor Dalling referred to them as "a fine body of Men and fit for immediate Service." Archibald Campbell, Dalling's replacement as Governor, was equally impressed, mentioning "with pleasure that the conduct of the Corps has ever been such as to merit His Majesty's favor."¹² The only enemies they faced were disease-bearing mosquitoes, and some settled into relatively comfortable routines. Decades later many of the American POWs who had been taken to Jamaica applied for pensions from the United States, and not surprisingly they give a very different impression from those of Montagu and the Governors of Jamaica. Jacob Gibson, whose name is on a Duke of Cumberland roster but who claimed to have been pressed into service, stated in his successful pension application that

he refused to work on board of said ship; that he was carried to the Island of Jamaica and imprisoned in the Bath Prison on said Island, (there were four others pressed at the same time who also refused to work, and were imprisoned at the same place, all of whom died). That he remained in Prison until peace was made, when he was liberated¹³

Like Sellers and Bradley quoted above, some admitted in their pension applications that they had joined the British, but they claimed to have served under duress. Their applications for pensions were rejected, as were several others that raised suspicion by being filed from Nova Scotia.¹⁴ William Spain¹⁵ initially claimed to have been transported to Nova Scotia as a prisoner, but after being exposed by a neighbor, he admitted that "becoming destitute of clothing and money and not receiving any help from the United States, he enlisted in March 1781 with the British for the sole purpose of getting clothing." It is not entirely true that the prisoners received no help from their country: each man received two dollars during the entire imprisonment, according to many applicants for pensions and bounty lands. It may not have been unreasonable for them to have felt they were owed something more than that.

Two months after the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment arrived in Jamaica, Cornwallis surrendered his army at Yorktown, and it became clear that Britain was going to lose the war. The Americans who had chosen to fight for the losing side realized they would not be welcome home. In August 1783, as the final treaty of peace was being negotiated, the British soldiers on Jamaica were polled to determine where they, with their families and servants, both black and white, would go after being discharged. Ninety-five chose to go to England, 110 chose to remain in Jamaica,¹⁶ and 263 elected to be resettled in Nova Scotia, joining thousands of other Loyalist refugees, including many free and enslaved Blacks.¹⁷

Lord Montagu arranged for the latter group to resettle at Chedabucto, Nova Scotia, (renamed Guysborough shortly afterward). Each private received 100 acres of land plus 50 acres for each additional family member, but many quickly abandoned the land.¹⁸ Montagu, himself, succumbed to the harsh conditions a few months after arriving, on 3 February 1784. A memorial in his honor reads in part:¹⁹

Fell a sacrifice to Public Zeal, through the inclemency of severe Winter in NOVA SCOTIA , where he was employed to settle a brave Corps of Carolinians, whom he had commanded during the late War between Great Britain and Spain.

LISTS OF FORMER PRISONERS IN THE DUKE OF CUMBERLAND'S REGIMENT

Table 1 below lists 41 men found in pension and bounty-land applications who are said to have enlisted, or can reasonably be concluded to have enlisted, in the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment. Twenty-eight omit any mention of having served the Crown, but the names of 15 of those are on rosters of the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment. All were taken prisoner at the surrender of Charleston except Stephen Howard, James Jones, and Frederick Reed, who were captured at the battle of Camden, and Nathan Pushee, captured at Moncks Corner SC on 14 April 1780.

Table 2 lists approximately 500 names of prisoners of war from Charleston who enlisted in the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment. In addition to the 41 in Table 1, it includes 24 other pension applicants who stated that they were prisoners at Charleston and whose names match those on rosters of the Duke of Cumberland's Regimental.. (Search for "Compare.") There is not enough evidence in these cases for me to be confident that the pension applicant was the same person who enlisted in the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment, although other researchers have concluded that they were.

Also listed in Table 2 are 88 names on a Muster Roll of Captain William Löwe's Company in the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment, dated at Fort Augusta, 2 October 1781, transcribed and generously shared by Todd W. Braisted.²⁰

In addition, Table 2 lists 18 names from "A Return of the Disbanded Men, Women & Children (late) of H. R. H. the Duke of Cumb'd Regiment," who came from Jamaica, arrived in October 1784, and settled at Shelburne, Nova Scotia.²¹ This list may include some names of men who had not been prisoners at Charleston.

These sources provided only a fraction of the total number, however, so I add the names transcribed by Murtie Jane Clark from "Recruiting List, Continental Prisoners of War taken at the surrender of Charlestown, 12 May 1780 and at Gates' Defeat by Cambden, 16 August 1780, now enlisted in His Majesty's service since 10 Feb 1781, for the West Indies in His Royal Highness, the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment of Carolina Rangers, commanded by the Right Honorable Lord Charles Montagu as enlisted by Captain William Lowe."²² This list includes the names of 76 recruited from the *Esk*, 50 from the *Success Increase*, 35 from the *King George*, 35 from the *Fidelity*, and 174 from the barracks.

Additional details for the above names were found in rosters listing those in the Duke of Cumberland's Regiment who settled in Nova Scotia from two sources in the archives of Canada and of Nova Scotia. The first source, listing 126 men, is a "Muster Roll of the Disbanded Officers and Privates with their wives, children & servants of his Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland's late Regiment settled at Chedabucto,

20 June 1784.”²³ The second source, with 35 names, is a “Provision Return for Men, Women and Children, belonging to Captain Whites Company of the late Duke of Cumberland’s Regiment Commencing the 25th of November 1784, and Ending the 24th of March 1785 both days inclusive.”²⁴ Not included in Table 2 are names in these sources that are not found on other lists, because many joined the regiment from the north. Also not included are the names of many prisoners at Charleston who were recruited into the regiment of Lt. Col. Jeffery Amherst, some of whom were transferred into the Duke of Cumberland’s Regiment on Jamaica. Included from these rosters are the names of eight Black Pioneers.

The names of some individuals are on two or more lists with different spellings. When this appears to be the case, I have merged the information and listed the different spellings on the same line. It is possible that I have inadvertently merged records for two soldiers with the same or similar names.
