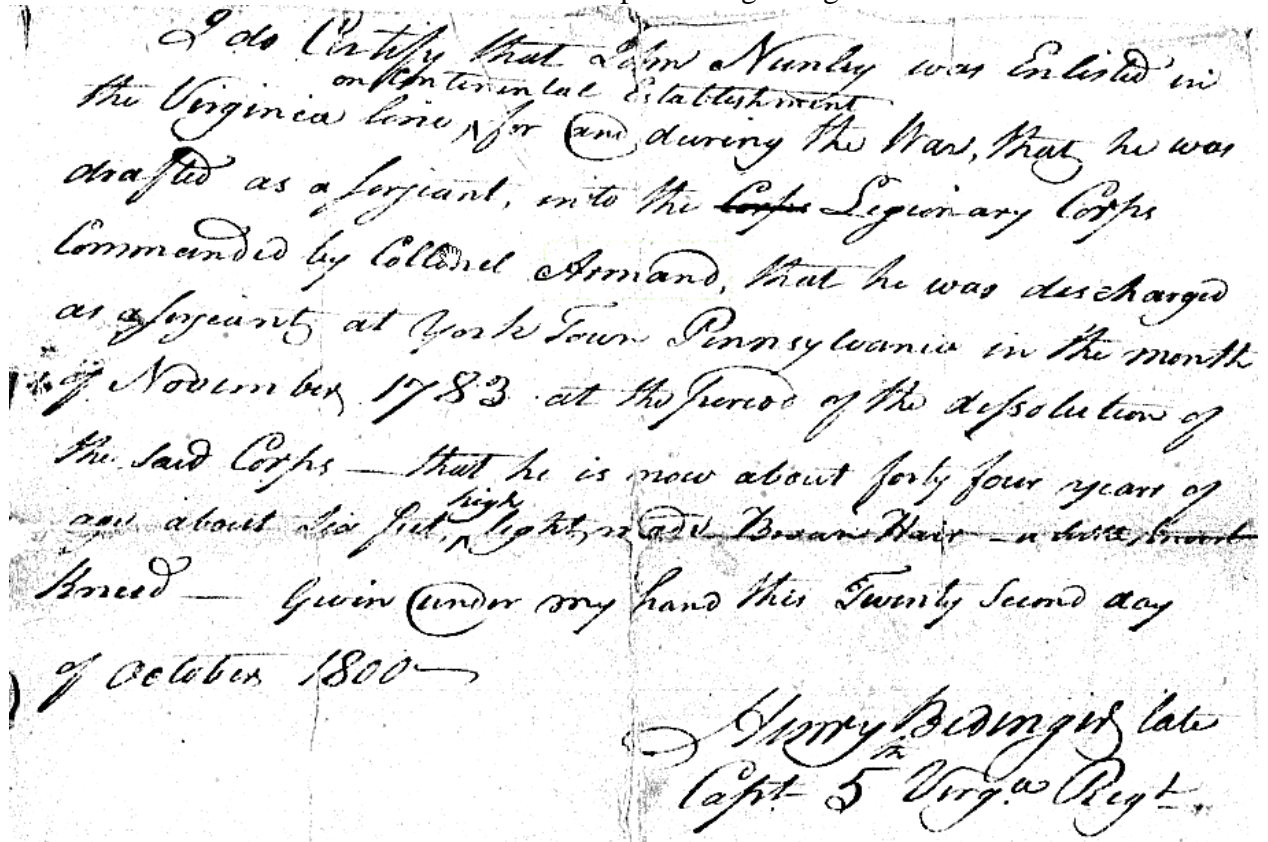

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do Certify that John Nunley was Enlisted in the Virginia line ^{on Continental Establishment} for and during the War, that he was drafted as a Sergeant, in the Legionary Corps commanded by Colonel Armand [Charles Armand, Marquis de la Rouerie], that he was discharged as a Sergeant at York Town Pennsylvania in the month of November 1783 at the period of the dissolution of said Corps – that he is now about forty four years of age about six feet high light [indecipherable word, paper partially damaged] Brown Hair – a little broad [?] Kneed – Given under my hand this twenty second day of October 1800

make Constitute and appoint Clement Green of Montgomery counting & State of Maryland my true and Lawful attorney for me and in my name to receive from the Register of the Land Office all Warrants for Lands due me for my services in Colonel Armands Legionary Corps – Hereby ratifying and Confirming all that my said Attorney shall legally do in the premises –

This may Certify that John Nunaley enlisted in the 2nd Virginia State Regiment as a Sergeant for three years, – prior to January 1777. That he exchanged with a Soldier of the 15th Virginia Continental Regiment who was also for three years from December 76; on or about the 10th of January 1778. That he reenlisted for the War and said Regiment on the 19th day of December 1778 – as a Sergeant. He continued to serve as a Sergeant until the first week in January 1782 when he was transferred to Armands [sic] Legionary Core. That he is since Dead while in the Army –
