Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." On this the Ninth Day of July A.D. 1855 personally appeared before me, Daniel Stephens a Justice of the Peace within and for the County and State aforesaid Jane McConnell aged about ninety years of age of Bedford County in the State of Tennessee who being duly sworn, declares that she is the widow of Benjamin McConnell, deceased, who was a private in the Company commanded by Capt. Joseph Byors [sic] in the \_\_\_ Regiment of light horse commanded by Major George Davidson in the War with Great Britain or Revolutionary war of independence declared by the United States on the 4th day of \_\_\_ A.D. seventeen seventy six, that her said husband

Benjamin McConnell volunteered in said company \_\_ County North Carolina on or about the \_\_ day of September A.D. 1781 for an indefinite term and continued in actual service in said Company and for the term of three weeks and was honorably discharged from said service at \_\_ County North Carolina on or about the 2nd day of October A.D. 1781 on account of expiration of the Campaign for which he enlisted and that his the said Benjamin McConnell's services will appear by the examination of his Certificate of discharge herewith filed with this declaration.

She further says that she was married to the said Benjamin McConnell 13th day of September A.D. 1808 by one Archibald Cathey, a minister of the gospel in Mecklenburg County State of North Carolina and that her name before marriage was Jane Rankin and that her said husband died in Bedford County, State of Tennessee on the 8th day of April A.D. 1820 and that she is still a widow.

She further states that she has not received, nor is not to her knowledge, entitled to receive Bounty Land under any act except those that she now applies for Bounty land under the act passed by Congress the 3rd day of March A.D. 1855.

She further states that having been married in North Carolina at so early a period and residing as she does now in Tennessee she cannot say whether there is any public record of her marriage or not, and that from her extreme age she cannot now think of sending back to find out. She stands almost alone in this country of those who started in life with her. And she can only furnish the evidence of her neighbors as to her reputed marriage -- which she trust may prove satisfactory to the department.
