[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Georgia County of Richmond

On this 6th day of March A.D. 1856 personally appeared before me, Thomas Skinner a Justice of the Inferior [Court] within and for the said County and State aforesaid, May Fraizer [sic] aged 97 years, a resident of Richmond, in the State of Georgia who, being duly sworn according to law, declares that she is the widow of John Frazer, deceased, who was a Lieutenant in the company commanded by Capt. *not recollected* in the Georgia Regiment of \_\_\_, commanded by \_\_\_, in the war with Great Britain 1776 that her husband the said John Fraser, [entered the service] on or about the \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_ A.D. 1777, for the term of the war, and continued in actual service in said war for the term of 5 years and was honorably discharged at Savannah, on the \_\_\_ day of \_\_\_ A.D. 1782.

She further states that she was married to the said John Fraser in 1792 on the 20th day of April A.D., by one \_\_ a, \_\_ and that her name before her said marriage was May Durden [? could be Dunden]; that her said husband died at Richmond County on the 5th day of July A.D. 1850 (crarzgy [?crazy?]), and that she is now a widow.

She further declares that she has not heretofore made application for bounty land nor obtain a land warrant.

She makes this application for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which she may be entitled under the "Act approved March 3, 1855."
