### **Pension Application of Samuel Wallace**

On this 18<sup>th</sup> day of September A.D. 1842 personally appeared in open Court before the Circuit Court of Bartholomew County now sitting Samuel Wallace a resident of Flat-Rock Township in the County of Bartholomew and State of Indiana aged eighty one years the 18 day of last February who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress past[sic] June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832 that he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers & served as herein stated That he enlisted as a volunteer in the Army of the United States for and during the continuance of the War That he so enlisted in the fall of the year 1779 as he believes but from old age & loss of memory is unable to say positively what time in the fall, and continued in the service during the remainder of the Revolutionary War That he enlisted in the company commanded by Andrew Wallace & in the county of Albemarle in the State of Virginia. That he served in the regiment commanded by Col. Morgan, as he believes. That he was in the battle at Guilford Courthouse [Mar. 15, 1781], and at the Cowpens [Jan. 17, 1781] and in the battle at the Eutaw Springs [Sept. 8, 1781], That he was discharged at the close of the War, That he has lost his discharge & knows of [no] person living by whom he can prove his service,

That he was born in the County of Albemarle and State of Virginia on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of February 1761 That he has a record of his age, in his old family Bible in his possession, That he was living in Albemarle County in the State of Virginia when he enlisted as above\_\_\_ That he has since the revolutionary war lived 8 years in the State of Georgia and twelve years in the State of Kentucky, since which time he has been living & is still living in the State of Indiana, That he believes Andrew Wallace and Col Morgan were regular officers with the troops where he served, That he believes his discharge was given by Colonel Washington<sup>1</sup>

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State

Be it known that before the Probate Court in and for said County began and holden in and for said County on the tenth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty one personally appeared Lilly Ann Wallace a resident of said County aged sixty two years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the arrears of Pension due to her late husband Samuel Wallace under the act of 7. June 1832\_\_\_ That she is the widow of Samuel Wallace who was a private in the war of the Revolution that he was at the Battle of King's Mountain [Oct. 7, 1780] , and was for a portion of the time under Colonel Cleveland<sup>2</sup> and she believes her

said husband was in the Militia of North Carolina but refers for the facts to the declaration of her said husband, under the act aforesaid \_ That she also made application about a year ago for the benefits of the same act in the County of Bartholomew in the State of Indiana where her said husband died and where she then resided but she is informed that the Declaration she then made is lost[.] That she was married to the said Samuel Wallace in the County of Bartholomew in the State of Indiana on the second day of March one thousand eight hundred and thirty one (1831). And that her husband the aforesaid Samuel Wallace died on the fourth day of December in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty three (1843)[.] That she has not intermarried, but is still the widow of said Samuel Wallace. That she makes this application for the purpose of attaining the arrears of pension due to her said husband under the act aforesaid from the second day of March 1831 to the 4<sup>th</sup> of December 1843 that being the date of his death.
