Pension Application of Hugh Call R1602

Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris

[The original application is not in the file. The following report is by US District Attorney Washington G. Singleton, who investigated many applicants from present West Virginia. For details see my appendix in the pension application S6111 of David W. Sleeth. On the cover of this report Singleton wrote "Greenbrier County" and "Not Entitled." From the report it appears that Call did not serve the minimum of six months required by the pension act of 1832.]

Hugh Call – Applicant

I the undersigned Hugh Call, state, that in the year 1782 I volunteered in Augusty [sic: Augusta] county Virginia under Capt Thomas Tart[?], and rendezvoused at Amurys[?] Barracks one mile from Staunton – upon being rendezvoused we were furloughed for one month. at the expiration of the time we reassembled at the Barracks and were mustered for two days and by orders of our Capt we continued to meet at the barracks monthly – and were mustered for two days in each month for about twelve months – and for six months thereafter we mustered at same place, – every two months – two days in each month – we received no pay. We drew no rations – I was born Jany 24, 1764. Hugh Call,

a copy – W. G. Singleton.

Note. this man called on me, said his declaration had been before the Department – and was returned – that he intended to renew his application and requested me to examine him, which I accordingly done but very briefly. – I understood that he was a man not of good character – after hearing his statement I concluded that I had best take it in writing in order to prevent a fraud which by possibility might be perpetrated.
