### Revolutionary Claims

Treasury Department, 13 December 1828

Samuel Bumpass of \_\_ in the County of Montgomery in the State of Tennessee has applied to the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefits of the act, entitled "An act for the relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the Revolution," approved the 15th of May, 1828. He states that he enlisted in the Continental line of the Army of the Revolution, for and during the war, and continued until its termination, at which period he was a private in Captain Lowes [could be "Sowes"] Company, in the \_\_ regiment of the North Carolina line; and that he received a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars, provided by the resolve of the 15th of May, 1778; and further, that he was not on the 15th of May, 1828, on the pension list of the United States, and that he has received as a pensioner since the 3rd of March, 1826, nothing

For the purpose of obtaining the Benefit of the I act entitled "An act for the relief of certain surviving officers and Soldiers of the Army of the revolution approved on the 15th May 1828 I Samuel Bumpass in the County of Montgomery and State of Tennessee do hereby declare, that I enlisted in the Continental Line of the Army of the revolution for and during the War and continued in its service until its termination at which Period I was a Private in Captain Lowe's Company in the \_\_Regiment of the North Carolina Line – And I also declare, that I afterwards received a certificate for the reward of \$80 to which I was entitled under a resolve of Congress of the 15th of May 1778 –

And I further declare that I was not, on the 15th of May 1828 on the Pension List of the United States.
