For the purpose of obtaining the benefit of an act for the relief of certain surviving Soldiers of the Army of the Revolution, Approved on the 15th of May 1828, I, John Lovett, of the State of North Carolina in the County of Carteret in the said State do hereby declare that I enlisted in the Continental Line of the Army of the Revolution, for and during two years and six months and continued in its service until the Expiration of the said Term it, which period, I was a Private in Captain George Mitchell's Company in the 6th Regiment of the Continental line. And, I also Declare I afterwards received a certificate for the reward of \$80 to which I was entitled, under a resolve of Congress Passed the 15th day of May 1778.

And I further declare that I was not, on the 15th day of March 1828, on the pension List of the United States.

Hill, one of the Justices of the peace in the County of Carteret, in the State of North Carolina Personally appeared this the 24th day of July 1828 Willoughby Prescott Senior and Joel Dixon of the said County who did severally make oath that, John Lovett by whom the foregoing declaration was subscribed is Generally reputed and believed to have been a Private in the Army of the Revolution in manner as therein stated,

John Lovett of ___ in the County of Carteret in the State of North Carolina has applied to the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefits of the act, entitled "An act for the relief of certain surviving officers and soldiers of the Revolution," approved the 15th of May, 1828. He states that he enlisted in the Continental line of the Army of the Revolution, for and during the war, and continued until its termination, at which period he was a private in Captain ___'s Company, in Sixth Regiment of the North Carolina line; and that he received a certificate for the reward of eighty dollars, provided by the resolve of the 15th of May, 1778; and further, that he was not on the 15th of May, 1828, on the pension list of the United States, and that he has received as a pensioner since the 3rd of March, 1826, nothing,
