[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

Georgia, Clark [Clarke] County

On this Third day of March 1828 before me, a Subscriber, a Justice of the peace for the said County of Clarke, personally appeared Daniel Conner who on his oath, declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the company commanded by Micajah Williamson in the Regiment commanded by Elijah Clarke in the Service of the United States: that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of Georgia, but has never received a formal certificate and now wishes to obtain one.

Sworn and Subscribed to before me the day and year aforesaid.

“Wilks [Wilkes] County December 29, 1791

I do hereby certify that the Bearer Daniel Conner a Lieutenant in Captain Micajah Williamson's Company in the Regiment of Militia under my command was wounded in an action with the British Troops in Augusta on the 14th Day of September 1780 in the right Knee.

“Georgia

These are to certify that I have examined and inspected Daniel Conner Lieutenant of Militia residing in this State who is an Invalid about forty Seven years of age having had his knee disabled in Battle whilst acting in the Service of the United States of America last War, and that he is entitled to receive half a Dollar per day according to a Law of this State, dated 13th February 1786.

Given under my hand at Savannah this be 20th day of August 1790.



[p 5: On February 7, 1854 in Clark [Clarke] County Georgia Elizabeth Cogburn, a resident of Clarke County, Ga., filed in that County stating that she is the daughter of Daniel Conner, a revolutionary soldier; that he died August 30, 1837 in Clarke County; that he was married to Martha; that Martha died April 13, 1842. Other documents indicate that the couple also had at least one other child, a son named Edward Conner.



[p 25: On November 8th, 1854 in Fayette County Georgia, Edward Conner executed a power of attorney in which he states he is the son of Daniel Conner late of Clarke County Georgia and a pensioner for services rendered in the revolutionary war.

[Veteran was initially pensioned at the rate of \$15.11 per month commencing April 24, 1816 for service in the Georgia Continental line.]
