

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

[p 4: In Pike County Georgia, Joseph Richard Culpepper of said County executed a power of attorney authorizing his attorney to pursue whatever claims may be due him as the son of Joseph Culpepper "for services rendered by my Father Joseph Culpepper in defense of his country in the war of the Revolution as Lieutenant in the cavalry company commanded by Captain Alexander belonging to the Brigade commanded by General Sumter."



The power of attorney is dated January 7, 1856.]

[pp 13-15: Certificate dated February 2, 1856 from the South Carolina Comptroller General reading as follows:

"I hereby certify that it appears from the list of the Continental Service of South Carolina now in this Office, that Joseph Culpepper served as a private in the 3rd South Carolina Regiment commanded by Colonel William Thompson dating from 20th of August 76 (services)."

Also, a copy of an indent dated October 1, 1784 issued to "Joseph Culpepper late first Lieutenant in Alexander's Troop, W. Hampton's Regiment and Sumter's Brigade for £141 being amount pay and bounty due him for services in this troop, together with interest thereon from the first April 1782 to the date agreeable to the Resolution of General Assembly of the 11th of March last."

[Note: This file contains no actual application or claim. Also, I did not find any note indicating that such a claim had ever been filed and removed from the file jacket.]



[p 10: Printed form of Indent No. 165 Book M dated October 1st, 1784 “delivered to Mr. Joseph Culpepper late 1st Lieutenant Alexander’s [Captain William Alexander’s] Troops: W. Hampton’s [Wade Hampton’s] Regiment Sumter’s [Thomas Sumter’s] Brigade this our Indented Certificate for the Sum of One hundred forty-one pounds Sterling being amount pay and bounty due him for services in that Troop together with Interest thereon from the first April 1782 to date hereof, Agreeable to resolve of General Assembly of the Eleventh March Last”]

[p 11: Reverse of the above Indent bearing endorsements by Thomas Sumter, Richard Richardson, William Henderson, John Reynolds and Samuel Reynolds. How any of these men acquired an interest in the Indent is not disclosed by the documents in this file.]

[p 19: Printed form of Indent No. 47 Book B dated August 1st 1791 “delivered to Joseph Culpepper this our Indented Certificate for the Sum of Ninety-Three Pounds Two Shillings and Ten Pence, for Duty with a Wagon, Team and Driver.”]

[Note: Most of the documents in this file relate to provisions supplied for military use during the Revolutionary war. Since those documents do not relate to actual military service, they have not been transcribed.]
