Pension application of Arthur Elliott (Eliott) R3300 Transcribed by Will Graves Mary Elliott f70SC 12/12/08 rev'd 12/24/14

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

## State of Georgia, Habersham County


On this fifth day of June 1849 Personally appeared before me Thomas B. Wheeler a Justice of the Inferior Court for Habersham County State of Georgia Mary Elliott a resident of the State of Georgia Habersham County; aged Eighty-three years who being duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision of the act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup> 1838 entitled an act granting half pay and pensions to certain widows, also the act of Congress passed the 3rd day of March 1843 likewise the act of Congress passed the 17th June 1844 and the act of Congress passed February 2<sup>nd</sup> day 1848. That she is the widow of Arthur Elliott who was a private in the revolutionary war under Captain Joseph Calhoun and Colonel Anderson's Regiment in the militia and served as stated in the Certificate of the Compt. [Comptroller] General of South Carolina which is hereunto attached. She further Declares that she was married to the said Arthur Elliott on the 4th day of July 1784 and that her husband the aforesaid Arthur Elliott died the 12th day of November 1837, That she was not married to him prior to his leaving the Service, but the marriage took place previous to the first day of January 1794 viz. at the time above Stated which will appear by the record hereunto attached which is the only prove that she knows of that can be obtained. [p 4, affidavit dated June 16, 1849 given by Samuel N. Elliott, a resident of Habersham County, that the following is the only record he knows of the marriage of Arthur Elliott to Mary Nelson; he states that he does not know whose handwriting the record is in:

To the Honorable Sent in House of Representatives of the United States in Congress assembled

Your Petitioner Samuel N. Elliott, son of Mary Elliott deceased, of the State of Georgia, most respectfully represents that his mother the said Mary Elliott died on the 10th day of October 1855 and was an applicant for a Pension as the widow of Arthur Elliott for services in the Revolutionary War, and that her claim has been suspended a number of times for the alleged cause that satisfactory evidence had not been furnished to authorize the allowance of her claim.

Your memorialist further represents that her papers are all on file in the Pension Office, that he has been advised and believes that there exist sufficient evidence among them, if properly explained, to authorize and allow the issuing of a Pension certificate according to Act of \_\_\_ 183\_ under which fact she applied in for further proof and information your memorialist respectfully refers your honorable body to the said papers, and humbly petitions and prays that an act of may be passed granting to him and the other heirs, whose names are as follows Andrew N. Elliott and Didyanna Chitwood the Pension which was justly due his mother the said Mary Elliott at her death under the said act of Congress approved on the \_\_ day of \_\_ 183\_.





[p 20: Is an affidavit given by John Starritt of Habersham County Georgia who says, among other things, that he was a Justice in the Inferior court when Arthur Elliott filed a claim under the 1832 act for his services in the revolution; that the papers were in the possession of Colonel Thomas J. Rusk, then the agent for Arthur Elliott; that Rusk shortly after that time moved to Texas and the deponent does not know what happened to the papers.]

[p 27, James S. Elliott, 55, of DeKalb County Georgia gave testimony that he was well acquainted with Arthur Elliott and his wife Mary Elliott of Habersham County; that deponent has "often heard him (Arthur Elliott), speaking of his services in the revolutionary war, conversing with other soldiers, speaking of the battles of the Cowpens [January 17, 1781], Kings Mountain

[October 7, 1780], Ninety Six [perhaps a reference to the siege of Ninety Six, May 22-June 19, 1781] and Ramsour's [June 20, 1780].]

[p 37: SC Comptroller General's certificate of payments made to Arthur Elliott for militia services per pay bill of Capt. Joseph Calhoun from the years 1780 to the year 1783]
