[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." State of South Carolina, York District

On this 16<sup>th</sup> day of June 1846, personally appeared before the Court of Equity now opened and held in Yorkville for the District of York & State aforesaid John Forbes, a resident of said District, aged 53 years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the act of Congress passed July 4<sup>th</sup> 1836, "Granting Pensions to Certain Widows"

That this declarant the aforesaid John Forbes in behalf of himself and the other heirs of John Forbes late Revolutionary Soldier deceased States, that the said John Forbes was a private and Lieutenant in the Army of the Revolution the heirs understand and as such he served the United States against the Common Enemy. That he the said John Forbes entered the Army of the Revolution in 1779 – or 1780, as Lieutenant, under Captain Moffit [John Moffett] & Colonel Watson [Samuel Watson] of the Militia, after which he joined Colonel Hill's [William Hill's] Company of the Cavalry where he served as a Lieutenant for some time and General Sumpter [Thomas Sumter], after the above service he served some time in the Militia, during which time he was wounded while in an engagement with the Enemy at Williamson's Plantation and that for many years before the death of the said John Forbes he received an invalid Pension which was paid him by the State of South Carolina, the State in which he resided when he rendered the above service.

This declarant further maketh oath, that the said John Forbes was married to Rebecca Barren in the fall of the year 1780, and as husband and wife they lived together till the death of the said John Forbes who died on the 24<sup>th</sup> day of October 1829, and that his widow of the aforesaid Rebecca departed this life on the 4<sup>th</sup> day of April 1837 not having intermarried after the death of the said husband the aforesaid John Forbes deceased.

And the Court does hereby certify that it was proven to the satisfaction of the Court that John Forbes above named died at his late residence in York District State of South Carolina on the 24<sup>th</sup> day of October 1829 leaving his wife Rebecca a widow, who died on the 4<sup>th</sup> day of April 1837, leaving surviving the following nine children, viz.: Elizabeth Shaw, Margaret McElwain, Anna Forbes, Tabitha Harberson, Rachel Jones, Archibald Forbes, Thomas Forbes, Arthur Forbes and John Forbes, who are the only surviving children of said deceased and all of lawful ages – And

that the declarant the aforesaid John Forbes is a person to whose statements is due full faith and credence.

Personally appeared Robert Wilson<sup>1</sup> a resident of York District and State aforesaid and made oath in due form of law that he was well acquainted with John Forbes of said District Deceased in time of and since the war of the revolution and served between four and five months with the said John Forbes [in] the year 1780 deponent well recollects that the aforesaid John Forbes was a Lieutenant in Col. William Hill's Regiment of Cavalry after he was wounded and believes the said John Forbes was generally in service until the close of the war.

Deponent further states that he was at the house of the said John Forbes several times during the years of '81 and '82 and well recollects that the said John Forbes had a wife and children at that time. Deponent further states that John Forbes lived in York District S. C. near Colonel William Hill's Iron works in time [of] the War and has often heard John Forbes say that he was a Lieutenant in Captain Moffet's Company before he was wounded deponent further states that the said John Forbes was in Captain John henreys [sic, John Henry's] Company, Hill's Regiment Sumter's Brigade when they were in service together in the year 1780.

[p 40: On August 14, 1846 in York District South Carolina, Jane Barron gave testimony that she was well acquainted with John Forbes, a soldier of the revolution; that the soldier and the affiant lived in the same neighborhood before and during the war; that John Forbes was an officer in said war under Col. Watson and Col. Hill's Regiment; that said John Forbes was wounded in the spring or summer of 1780 and was married to Rebecca Barron in the summer or fall of the same year, 1780; that they lived together as man and wife from that date; that affiant recalls that Forbes was wounded in the same year that Col. William Hill's Iron Works were burnt which was on the 10<sup>th</sup> of May 1780; that the veteran and his wife had 2 or 3 children before peace was made, viz., Elizabeth and Margaret, the 2 eldest children of the veteran. She signed her affidavit with her mark. Her relationship, if any, to the widow is not stated.]

[p 47: On April 28, 1853 in York District South Carolina, Katherine Tate gave testimony that she was born February 16, 1770; that her father lived within three quarters of a mile of John Forbes who was "cut to pieces by the Tories & left for dead" but he got well again; affiant recollects hearing her father say "he helped clean the maggots out of John Forbes"; that affiant went to school together with Rebecca Barron, afterwards the wife of John Forbes; affiant thinks that John and Rebecca were married before the close of the Revolutionary War. She signed her affidavit with her mark.]

To the Honorable the Speaker of the House of representatives now sitting in General Assembly The Humble petition of John Forbis [sic] Sheweth

That your petitioner was while in the military service of the State in the revolutionary War and under the command of Colonel Neal [sic, Andrew Neel] wounded by the British under the command of Colonel Hook [sic, Christian Huck] [Battle of Williamson's Plantation, July 12, 1780]<sup>4</sup> and that by the wounds he received he is rendered unable in his old age to provide for his himself and family and that he has no other means of providing a subsistence then by his own labor.

Your Petitioner therefore prays your Honorable body to take his case into consideration and if it shall you seem expedient to place him on the list of pensioners or to grant him such assistance as you in your bounty think proper.

Upon Examining the Wounds of Mr. John Forbis [sic] Senior I believe them to render him partially Incapable of making a Competent Support for himself & family – who are dependent upon his Exertions, his Extreme age taken into consideration with the violence of his Wounds renders him more incapable of that Exertions, which Seems necessary for him to make in order to make a subsistence.

South Carolina York District} Personally came Joseph Forbis [sic] before me who being duly Sworn make oath in the form of law that he is a brother of John Forbis [sic] and that the said John Forbis was a Military Soldier under Curnal Neal [sic] in the Revolutionary war that he was literally cut to pieces and wounded in such a manner that he was entirely unable to make a Support for himself and family and that by his wounds now in his old age renders him incapable of making a sufficient Support for his family whose dependence on him.

Also came Captain Joseph McCorkle [paper damaged and part of his name missing] and Mary Smith who on oath saith that they were personally acquainted with John Forbis in the Revolutionary war and that the above affidavit is true As they were frequently with the said John Forbis.
