Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

State of Alabama, Butler County August Term 1832 County Court

On this 13th day of August 1832 personally appeared in open Court before James Lane Judge of said Court now sitting Brinkley Gandy a resident of said County aged between 90 & 100 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 7 June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

He has no record of his age he believes from the information of his parents that he is between ninety & one hundred years of age. He was born in Edgecombe now formed into Nash County North Carolina where he lived when he entered the service. He was drafted in the 4th division at the commencement of the war [for] three months tours, the first tour he hired a substitute who served it out and during this tour the battle at Guilford County House [Guilford Court House, March 15, 1781] was fought this is what he recollects the date ____ —Edward Gandy was Captain – Major Hardy Griffin was Major Colonel Thomas Hunter – The 2nd Tour of three months he served himself under Captain Howel Fluellen [Howell Flewellen]-- Major Edward Gandy – same Colonel – this Tour was passed in scouts against the enemy about the Country. The station was at one E. Nicholson Esq. He was discharged by his Major. Third Tour he had a substitute who served out three months more making nine months in the whole at which time war ceased. He received in every case a discharge from his officers to the best of his recollection all which have been destroyed. He can prove his services in a great measure by Mr. Noah Whiddon who lived near him at the time.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

He moved into Darlington South Carolina upwards of forty years after the war & then moved to this state.

Sworn to and subscribed the day & year aforesaid.

In open court personally came Noah Whiddon who being duly sworn on his oath says that he knew the said Brinkley Gandy before and during the revolutionary war, that he was a faithful soldier and a true Whig. He knew of his being in the service as he has stated, he knew his officers Griffin, Fluellen, Hunter and Gandy and lived near and in the same County the while. He believes him to be as old as he says he is.
