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State of Tennessee Monroe County:

On this seventh day of November 1844 personally appeared in open Court James Levins a resident of the County and State aforesaid, aged eighty-two years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 -- that he enlisted in the Army of the United States, in the year 1781, and served in the __Regiment of the Georgia line. He further declares that he enlisted under Lieutenant Jos. Ryan [Joseph Ryan, possibly James Ryan] and served in Captain Charles Williamson's Company under Colonel John Clark. He further states that where he entered the service, he lived in Wilkes County Georgia and he thence marched to the Oconee River where the soldiers built a Fort, and where they were stationed twelve months, during which time they had several skirmishes with the enemy. He also states he received a discharge for twelve months services from Colonel Clark, but which has been long since lost or mislaid. And he further declares that he has no documentary evidence by which he can prove his services, neither does he know of any living witness at this time by whom he can make any further proof.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension Roll of the agency of any State.
