State of North Carolina Anson County

On this 28th day of December 1820 before me, the Subscriber a Justice of the peace for the said County of Anson personally appeared James Redfarn who on his oath declares that he is the same person who formerly belonged to the company commanded by Captain James White in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Thomas Wade in the service of the United States, that his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of North Carolina and that he never received a Certificate of that fact under the signature and seal of the Secretary of.

Sworn and subscribed before me the day and year aforesaid.

[letter dated January 25, 1933, contains the following statements:

"James Redfarn, of Anson County, North Carolina, was allowed pension from September 5, 1808, at the rate of \$3 per month, on account of disability incurred during the Revolutionary War; the nature of the disability not shown. Under the Act of April 24, 1816, his pension was increased to \$4.80 per month.

His birthplace, age, names of parents, and residence at enlistment are not shown. The papers in his application for disability pension were destroyed when the War Office was burned in 1814."]
