Pension Application of Thomas Jones S34940

State of Maryland } Thomas Jones of the said County and State appeared before me  
Anne Arundel County } the subscriber Associate Judge of the third Judicial District of the  
State of Maryland and being duly Sworn on the Holy Evangels of Almighty God deposed said  
and declared that he Enlisted in the Maryland line for the war in 1780 and served faithfully to  
the end thereof, that he was at the taking of Cornwallis [19 Oct 1781] & marched to South  
Carolina and there remained untill peace; the said Thomas Jones further deposed said and  
declared as aforesaid that from his reduced circumstances he needs the assistance of his  
country for support

Sworn to before me the 26<sup>th</sup> May in the year 1818.

I certify that it appears by the Pay Roll of the Troops in the Maryland Line that Thomas Jones a  
private received Arrears of Pay from the 1<sup>st</sup> Aug't. 1780 to the 15<sup>th</sup> Nov'r. 1783.

State of Maryland Third Judicial District

Anne Arundel County towit:

On this twentieth day of September 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a  
Court of Record and constituted such by the Constitution and laws of the State of Maryland for  
Anne Arundel County aforesaid, Thomas Jones, aged Sixty six years resident in the County  
aforesaid in said District, who first being duly sworn, according to Law doth on his Oath declare  
that he served in the revolutionary War as follows, that he enlisted in Captain Bealls Company of  
the third Maryland Regiment (who was in the service of the United States army the revolution  
War) commanded by Colonel [Peter] Adams in the year seventeen hundred and eighty as a  
private and that he continued in the service till the termination of the war when he was  
discharged. That he follows the Occupation of a Labourer and is not able to obtain subsistence  
by his labour, that he has a wife living with him who is also upwards of sixty years of age and  
who is too feeble to work: and that he has no children living with him to aid in his and his wifes  
support: and that he and his wife have in part been maintained for some years past by Charity  
from his Neighbours.

This Deponent further saith, that he is on the Pension List and his original declaration  
bears date on the 26<sup>th</sup> day of may 1818 and his Certificate bears date on the 21<sup>st</sup> day of August  
1818 and No. 2289.

And I the said Thomas Jones do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the  
United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any  
manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to  
bring myself within the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled "An Act to provide for certain  
persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War"  
passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any  
property or securities contracts or debts due to me, nor have I any income other than what is  
contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.
