On this 18th day of May 1819 before me, the subscriber, Judge of the Washington Circuit Court for the said district, personally appeared George Childer aged 6^y years, resident in Washington County in the said district, who, being by me first duly sworn, according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the provision made by the late act of Congress, entitled "An act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war:" That he, the said George Childer enlisted for the term of four years on the day of April in the year 1776 in the company commanded by Captain Joseph Crockett in the line of the state of Virginia in the company commanded by Colonel Morgan in the line of the state of Virginia on the Continental Establishment; that he continued to serve in the said corps, or in the service of the United States, until the end of four years when he was discharged from service in the state of Maryland that he ~~was in the battle of~~ enlisted for two years at that time when his term expired he again enlisted for two years and that he is in reduced circumstances, and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support; and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said services.

Sworn to and declared before me, the day and year aforesaid.

I, William L. Kelly, Judge, &c. as aforesaid, do certify that it appears, to my satisfaction, that the said George Childer did serve in the revolutionary war, as stated in the preceding declaration, against the common enemy, for the term of nine months at one time, on the continental establishment; and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken and had before me, to the Secretary for the Department of War, pursuant to the directions of the aforementioned act of Congress. I am also satisfied that he needs the assistance of his country for support.

Washington Circuit Sct:

On this 17 day of August 1820 personally appeared in open court (being a court of record for the said County), George Fielder, aged about seventy four years old resident in Washington County and in the State aforesaid who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary war as follow. To wit: he was inlisted [sic] about the year 1776 in the state of Virginia in Capt Joseph Crockett Company in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Morgan formerly of _____ [blank in original] that he received a discharge in Frederick Town Maryland. That his pension certificate is number 16462. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen of the United States on the 18 day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my estate or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or security contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income whatsoever other than as contained in the foregoing following schedule hereto annexed.



[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

These are to Certify that George Fielder Formally a Soldier in the 5th Virginia Regiment has dutifully and faithfully served the Term of years for which he was Enlisted in Consequence of which and at his own Request he is hereby discharged from any further Service in the Army of the United States and permitted to Returned to his home free & unmolested he having Received

all his Bounty pay & Clothing & Deficiencies of pay & Clothing, in full of all allowances & provision made by the Congress for their Troops – his receipt for which is on the back hereof.
Given under my hand at Philadelphia this 28th day of January 1780
