Pension Application of Isaac Jackson S38072

Mason County }

On this 16th day of September in the year 1822 personally appeared before the superior court of law for the said county (being a court of record proceeding according to the course of common law with Jurisdiction unlimited in point of amount) Isaac Jackson aged about eighty years to the best of his belief, a resident of said county of Mason who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provisions made by the acts of Congress of the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818 and the 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820: That he the said Isaac Jackson enlisted for the term of three years on the [blank] day of [blank] in the year [blank] in Battetourt county in the state of Virginia in the company commanded by Captain Rowly or Roland Madison [Rowland Madison, company raised in Botetourt County 16 Dec 1776] in the 12th Virginia Regiment commanded by Colonel [James] Wood belonging to General Scotts [Charles Scott's] Brigade in the line of the State of Virginia on the Continental establishment That he continued to serve in the said Corps until the expiration of the said three years for which he had enlisted; when he was discharged from the muster roll at Philadelphia in the same year the British took possession of Charlestown (S. Carolina) [Charleston, 12 May 1780] – That he was in the battles of Brandywine [11 Sep 1777] and Monmoth [sic: Monmouth NJ, 28 June 1778] besides in several skirmishes. That he formed one of the Guard to the battery at Stony Point [sic: Stony Point NY] on the north river where I was taken by General [Anthony] Wayne – That in said engagements he escaped receiving any wounds although his hat & cloaths were literally riddled That in the battle of Brandywine after firing upwards of eighty rounds he was taken prisoner and continued such eleven months before he was exchanged. – that he has lost his discharge & has no other evidence now in his power to offer of his said services.

And in pursuance of the Act of the 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820 I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled “an act to provide for certain person engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War” passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property or securities contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Which Schedule contains two horses seven head of cattle young & old about twelve head of hogs young & old and four sheep.

This declarant also states that he cultivates a small piece of ground which is not his own – that his family consists of himself and wife only, who like himself is also aged and very infirm
