Pension Application of William Milirons S38222

Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris

State of Georgia } Personally appeared before us the undersigned Justices of the Inferior Court of
Warren County } the county aforesaid in the State aforesaid, and forming a quorum of said Court,
William Millirons, who being duly sworn saith, that he belonged to the army of the Revolution – that he
joined the regular army at Morristown, New Jersey in the beginning of the year 1777 and continued three
years in service – that he belonged to the twelfth Virginia regiment and [blank] Brigade and was
commanded by Capt Robert Gamble, Col. James Wood and General [Charles] Scott, and was in the battle
of Monmouth [28 Jun 1778] under the command of said officers – that after the expiration of his term of
enlistment he returned home and shortly after again entered the army and was commanded by Captains
[William] Bentley, Barber [possibly Thomas Barbee] and Wilson and Lieut. Hackley [probably James
Hackley] and Maj'r. [Smith] Snead, under General [Nathanael] Green, and was in the battle of the Eutaw
[Eutaw Springs SC, 8 Sep 1781] under the command of the four last mentioned officers – that he
continued in the army till his term of service expired, say eighteen months – that he delivered is discharge
to Capt. Wm. Long, as his certificate now produced will verify – that he has no further evidence to
confirm the foregoing statement of facts, except the papers marked A. B. C. D. E. & F, at present in his
power to adduce. And that from his reduced circumstances he needs the assistance of his country for
support

I do certify that I deliverd William Milirons Discharge into the hands of Capt James Culb[page torn] for to
draw his pay Which said Culbertson R[page damaged] is in the Auditors office for the money and that I
never Traded s'd Discharge to any person or persons whatever, and I am willing to take oath at any time
that I Delivrd s'd discharge to s'd Cubertson Given Under my hand this 6th Feby 1787 Wm Long

Capt. James Culbertson came before me, a Justice of the peace for Augusta County and made
solemn oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty god, That he did receive certificates for two Soldiers
services from Capt Wm Long, one of which was [in] the name of William Milirons that those two with
some others he put into the hands of Capt. Clay who had them Audited & sent by Mr. Alex'r St. Clair to
him the said deponent. That the auditor certificate with one more which he understood from said Long
was his own property, he the said [several illegible words] Longs Neighbors, but cannot recollect the
persons name at present Given under my hand this 3^d day of March 1787 R Gamble

This day William Millirons came before me a Justice of the Peace for s'd County and made oath
that he put into the hands of Cap William Long his discharge for Eighteen months service in the United
States in order for the s'd Captain Long to settle his acct & draw a Certificate for the same & that he never
sold transfered nor disposed of the s'd Discharge to any person whatever, nor has he ever rec'd any
compensation for the s'd Eighteen months service

Georgia } Personally appeared before me, William Mellirons, who being duly sworn saith
Warren County } that he enlisted in the continental service of the Untied States of America under
Capt Robert Gamble of the twelfth Virginia Regiment, commanded by Col. James Wood in General
Scott's Brigade, and continued three years in the service – during which period he was in the battle of
Monmouth – afterwards served one year and an half under General Greene – during which last period
was in the battle of Guilford [Guilford Courthouse NC, 15 Mar 1781], of Hobkirks Hill near Camden [25
Apr 1781] and Eutaw. That he served for the period of nine months and more at one and the same time –
that his circumstances are so reduced as to require the assistance of his Country being at this time
supported by the assistance of said County of Warren – all which will more fully appear reference being
had to papers some months since forwarded by mail to the War Department.

Milions/ age 22/ height 5' 7" / farmer/ born in Augusta County VA/ residing in Montgomery County/
enlisted on 11 Sep 1780 for 18 months.
