Pension Application of Dennis Lowe S38917

South Carolina } On this fourth day of October 1820 personally appeared in open Court being a Court of Record for this district and state aforesaid Dennis Lowe aged About fifty six years resident in South carolina Edgefield Dist who being first duly Sworn according to Law doth on his Oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the act of Congress of the 18th March 1818 and the 1st May 1820 that the said Dennis Lowe enlisted for the term of five years & the fall of seventeen hundred & Eighty one as nearly as he can now recollect in the state of Myreland County of Prince George [sic: Prince Georges County, Maryland] in the Troop of Cavaldry Commanded by Capt Lee Brown [sic: Jerome Le Brun de Bellecoeur] the number of Rejiment not recollected commanded by Col. Armong [sic: Charles Armand; Armand Charles Tuffin, Marquis de la Rouerie] of the Continental Army that he continued to serve in the same Troop until the end of the war when he was discharged at little York in pensylvania sometime in the year 1783 having served upwards of two years that his discharged was burnt in his house and in pursuance of the act of the first May 1820 he does solmly swear that he was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that he has not since that time by gift sale or in any manner disposed of his property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring himself within the provisions of an act of Congress entitled “an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the Revolutionary War” passed on the 18th day of March 1818 and that he has not nor has any person in trust for him any property or securities contracts or debts due to him nor has he any income other than what is contained in the Schedule (viz One Note on Daniel Goodman for 86 dollars and he insolvent that he is very infirm from sickness so as not to be able to follow his Occupation of planter which sickness has lasted him nearly five years and thus continues sickly & that he has five children all of age except one and all of them reside in Georgia in a different state so that he has no one to whom he can look or on whom he can depend for a support or livelihood. Know all men by these presents that we Bazel and Dennis Low of The Edgefield District South Carolina do hereby constitute and appoint Thomas J Northup of Washington City our true and Lawfull attorney with powers of substitution for us and in our names to ask Demand and receive from the Secretary of Ware of the United States a warrant for the bounty land due us in right of our services as sauldiers of Armands Corps of the Army of the Revolution... in and for said District Bazel and Dennis Low signers and sealers of the foregoing Power of Attorney and acknowledged the same to be their voluntary act and due for the purposes therein names also each being duly sworn according to law say that their original residence was Preince [sic: Prince] Georges County Maryland – that they both inlisted in the Company commanded by Capt Le Barron or Le Brown of Armands Corps of the Army of the Revolution for the period of five years or during the war and served faithfully untill the war was ended or as long as their services were wanted when the were discharged at Little York Pa. That they with their fathers family moved from Maryland to this state forty years ago or more. that they both are at this time receiving Pensions from the United States as Revolutionary sauldiers the one \$120 and the other \$96 per annum where their original applications will be found on the files at Washington City. That they have never at any time received a warrant from the United States for the

bounty land due them in right of such service neither have they ever assigned or transfered their right to the same in any manner whatever
