[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

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State of North Carolina, Franklin County: Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions June Term 1820

On this fourteenth day of June 1820 personally appeared in open Court, being a Court of record for the said County Nathan Jean aged Sixty-eight years, resident in Franklin County aforesaid, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath, declare that he served in the revolutionary War as follows: and Captain Ballard's [Kedar Ballard's] Company of the 10th Regiment, was mustered on the \_\_day of \_\_ in the year 1779, and that he was discharged the first December 1779.

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or otherwise disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed one Cow & Calf one sow & 4 pigs, 4 plates, one Basin, 1 Dutch oven, 1 Broken pot, 4 knives & forks, & 3 spoons ~~1~~ keg

That the said Nathan Jean is a Black Smith [blacksmith] by trade, but is unable to make a support by his trade in consequence of having a rupture, that he has a wife aged about Sixty-five years and is indebted as he believes about fifteen dollars.

It appears from the muster rolls of the North Carolina Continental line, that Nathan Jeanes a private in Captain Ballard's Company of the 10th Regiment enlisted on the \_\_ day of \_\_ 1779 for the term of \_\_ and that he was discharged the first day of December 1779.

I William Hill Secretary of State in and for the State aforesaid do hereby certify that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary War, that

Nathan Jeans a private in Captain Ballard's Company of the 10th Regiment was mustered in the year 1779 for \_\_\_ that he was discharged on the first day of December 1779. I do further Certify that there were no Soldiers enlisted for a less term than 9 months, and that I have no doubt he the said Jean was enlisted for 9 months and served out his time.



State of North Carolina, Franklin County

This day came Tilmond Patterson<sup>1</sup> before me Kinchin Williams one of the justices of the County of Franklin in State aforesaid and made oath that he new [knew] Nathan Jean a private soldier in the U.S.A. of the Continental line, I saw him soon after the Battle was over at Stono [June 20, 1779]<sup>2</sup> with a wound in his [illegible word, looks like 'thy', could be an attempt to spell 'thigh']<sup>3</sup> -- and served his term as a soldier to the best of my knowledge and belief -- further this deponent saith not. Sworn and subscribed to this 3rd of March 1823.
