[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Virginia, Charlotte County to wit:


On this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of September 1832, personally appeared in open Court, before the County Court of Charlotte, now sitting, Alexander Hunter a resident of said County and State, aged Seventy Six years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832. That he entered two tours as a Soldier in the militia of the Virginia during the Revolutionary War.

1<sup>st</sup> In the year 1781 in the month of January he marched from the County of Charlotte (where he then & has ever since resided) under the command of Captain Richard Gaines to Portsmouth on the Elizabeth River, he was at Norfolk, Williamsburg, Hobbs Hole and other places, he remained but a short time at any one place. Colonel Fleming [Charles Fleming] and General Muhlenberg [Peter Muhlenberg] were the Commanding Officers – he recollects but two Companies of Continentals, one Commanded by Captain Long afterwards Major Long and the other by Captain Saunders, he was discharged early in April of the same year after having served three months – he received no discharge that he recollects.

2<sup>nd</sup> In the same year 1781 in the month of June or July he was again drafted and marched again to Portsmouth under the Command of Captain Wallace [Andrew Wallace], Thomas Paule [?]<sup>1</sup> a Lieutenant – Colonel Richardson [probably Holt Richeson] and General Lawson [Robert Lawson] were the Commanding Officers he served the whole tour three months at Portsmouth & in the neighborhood and was discharged in September or October of the same year – during this tour he acted as Sergeant.


He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

Charlotte County (to wit)

This day Benjamin Marshall<sup>2</sup> came before me a Justice of the peace for the County aforesaid and made oath that he was with Alexander Hunter in the Army at York and served a tower [tour] of duty with him for three months that the said Hunter served and acted as Sergeant in Captain Andrew Wallace's Company from Charlotte County.

Given under my hand this 3<sup>rd</sup> September 1832

I do hereby certify that I James Pugh<sup>3</sup> served a tower of duty with Ellick Hunter [sic] under Captain Richard Gaines at Portsmouth in the year of 1781, we left home the 9<sup>th</sup> of January the same year and discharged the 9<sup>th</sup> of April.

This day James Pugh personally appeared before me a justice of the peace for said County and made oath that the above certificate was true in every particular.

Given under my hand and seal this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of September 1832

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$25 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831 for service as a private & Sergeant in the Virginia militia service for 6 months.]
