## Pension application of William Anderson S6512 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Edgecombe County: August Term 1832 Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions

On this \_\_ day of August personally appeared in open Court before the Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions now sitting, William Anderson, aged 75 -- a resident of Edgecombe County, who being sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated. --

He enlisted under Capt. John Grey [John Gray] for twelve months. The company was attached to the Regiment of Col. Sumner [Jethro Sumner]. He was ordered to Wilmington and accompanied the Regiment from Wilmington to Charleston -- at the time General Lee [Charles Lee] as in command -- after remaining some time in Charleston he went to Savannah Georgia. After having been in camp at Savannah for a considerable length of time he went to Ossibo [Ossabaw?] Island and having there put up provisions they returned to Savannah and remained until the death of the Capt. The company was dissolved and he returned to Halifax and was discharged. This service embraced a period of 12 months.

He again entered as a substitute in the service of the United States under Capt. Edward Clinch -- with [illegible first name] Hale 1<sup>st</sup> Lieut. This company belonged to the Regiment of Col. Jos. Clinch [Joseph Clinch]. He went through the southern part of North Carolina and passing through South Carolina entered Georgia and engaged the enemy at Brier Creek [Briar Creek, March 3, 1779]. After the defeat at Briar Creek he returned to North Carolina.

He soon enlisted as a substitute in the company of Capt. Bradley [George Bradley]. This company belonged to the Regiment of Col. Mebane [Robert Mebane]. The company was organized in Kingston [sic, Kinston] NC from Kinston he went on to Charleston and remained there more than a year. He was there during the siege and when Charleston capitulated [May 12, 1780] he was taken prisoner by the British. He was about six weeks guarded as a prisoner and made his escape and returned to North Carolina.

The first clause in this declaration he sustains by Micajah Petway.<sup>1</sup>

The second clause he sustains by the evidence of Lewis Todd<sup>2</sup> and Barrett Bradley. The third clause he sustains by the evidence of Nath Bradley [sic, Nathaniel Bilbry<sup>3</sup>] in

part -- the rest is unsustained save by the oath of himself.

He hereby relinquishes all claim to a pension except the present -- and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency of any State.

State of North Carolina Edgecombe County: June 14th 1833

Personally appeared before me H. Austin a Justice of the Peace in and for the County of aforesaid Wm Anderson, who being duly sworn deposeth and saith.

That he was born in the County of Edgecombe, State aforesaid, where he has continued to reside during his whole life with the exception of one year when he lived in the County of Johnson [sic Johnston]. He has not in the declaration mentioned the periods of the war when he served in the armies of the United States in consequence of his being unable from loss of memory to specify the same: but he mentioned circumstances of sufficient notoriety he hoped, to enable the department to decide favorably upon his application.

He did not allude to the fact of his service as corporal and Sgt. for the reason that he was unwilling to embarrass his application by claims he might be unable to substantiate. He was not aware at the time that his declaration was made, that the Certificate which was afterwards procured at Raleigh could be had -- indeed it was afterwards obtained without his knowledge; and the apparent discrepancy between the certificate and the declaration is thus explain.

He entered as a substitute in the town of Tarborough and was received by Capt. Blount [Reading Blount] who was acting as a receiving officer -- and the men that were carried to Kingston [sic, Kinston], before companies were formed -- when they were organized, the declarant was cast in the company of Capt. Bradley [George Bradley]. The certificate is wrong

in stating that he enlisted as corporal. Declarant would merely remind the Department that the men never enlisted as corporals -- these offices being subsequently appointed by the commissioned officers -- at least such was the case during the period of his service.

Applicant has not procured evidence from a clergyman because none is resident in Tarborough and his age and infirmities put it out of his power to travel far for any cause whatsoever, and he felt that the direct evidence of Petway, Todd and Bilbry as to his services would have obviated its necessity.

Applicant deposes that in the tour embraced in the first clause of his declaration he served twelve months -- in the second five months and in the last eighteen months, during the last. He served as Cpl. and for a short time, that it regular intervals as Sgt., and for these services he claims a pension.

I William Hill Secretary of State in and for the State aforesaid do certify that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary war that William Anderson a private in Capt. Blount's company of the 10th Regiment enlisted on the 20th of July 1778 for nine months was made Sgt. 25th of October 1778 and reenlisted as a Cpl. the 20th May 1779 for 18 months, nothing more is said of him on said rolls.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1831, for service as a private for 2 years in the North Carolina service.]
