[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]





[p 10: Reverse of the above Indent bearing what appears to be an assignment of his right and title in the Indent by David Carson to Sampson Turner. The assignment is dated May 20, 1787 and signed as follows:

A high-contrast, black and white image of a handwritten signature. The signature is written in a cursive style and appears to read "David Carson". The ink is dark and the background is light, with some speckling. The signature is enclosed in a small rectangular box.

[Note: It is possible that this David Carson is the same one whose transcript appears as SC1202. I have separated them, however, because the purported signatures of the 2 veterans is markedly different. Assuming the signatures are authentic, then the claims must be by 2 different men named David Carson. This supposition is further reinforced by the fact that both claims cover service rendered after the fall of Charleston. It would be the logical for all claims for such service to have been made in the same claim unless the claimants were 2 distinct individuals.]
