

² I believe these to be the signatures of Colonel Thomas Walker and Colonel William Hill, both of the South Carolina militia.

³ Men who served in the 10 months State Troop Brigade recruited by Thomas Sumter were promised payment in the form of slaves confiscated from Tories. This horrendous method of payment was known as "Sumter's Wages."
