[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indcipherable' or 'undciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

N: B: after charging his Pay as Major, he then Charges as a Lieut., & immediately from that as a Lieut. Col. the Account is not properly made out, it ought to show what time the Pay Commenced, and how he can charge 90 days on the 7<sup>th</sup> March 1781 as Lieut. & on the very same day 135 days as Lieut. Col., I cannot conceive. I have been obliged to make a State [statement] of the Accounts out & it plainly appears that 199 days are charged as Captain (the Amount £696.10 Currency) more than are in the space of time, between the 5<sup>th</sup> March 1780 and the 1<sup>st</sup> June following; also there are 8 days less in the dates of the 15<sup>th</sup> December 1780, & the 7<sup>th</sup> of March 1781 as Lieut. (£18), & the 135 days Pay Charged as Lieut. Col. on the said 7<sup>th</sup> day of March 1781 amounting to £675 Currency is certainly wrong the 3 Sums which Seem to be Errors, amount to £1389.10/ Currency or £198.10/ Sterling

Two Horses and Sundry Articles are also charged, Captain Glase [sic, Thomas Glaze] who was under the command of Col. Kimball Certifies that the Horses were lost
