[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]



To the Honorable the President & members of the Senate of South Carolina

The prayer of your petitioner humbly Sheweth that your petitioner was a Soldier in the Revolutionary war & performed Service under Col. James Liles in the Company of Capt. John Liles from the year 1778 to the Close [of the] war & never has received any Compensation therefore & your petitioner has made several applications & trials to get my pay which I understood the Same Company was returned at the close of the War & allowed one years pay at one Dollar per day, but by Some means or other my name is not to be found on the List which has prevented me from ever as yet of getting any Satisfaction for My Services, altho your petitioner Served faithfull in the Defense of our Country & your petitioner at this time is unable to walk one Step without Crutches & has been so for four or five years & likely to never walk again as the Joint of my thigh & hip is entirely dislocated by reason pains, I therefore submit my Cause to your honorable body hoping you will take the Case of your petitioner in mature Consideration & Grant him such relief as you in your Wisdom deem Right & your petitioner as in duty bound will pray &c



Personally appeared before me Din Talley one of the Justices in and for the District aforesaid Mathew Mabin who being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelist of Almighty God Deposeth and Saith that he did perform State duty as a Soldier under the Command of Col. James Liles deceased and this deponent further saith that he has received no compensation for his Services from the year 1778 to the close of the War, and this deponent further saith that he left the State aforesaid in the year 1783 which perhaps is the reason his account was not returned

John Earle who drew on the [undeciphered word or words] of the order in favor of Robert Prince – to whom the Indent for forty five pounds eleven Shillings and five pence Sterling was delivered – your committee therefore Beg leave to recommend that the prayer of the petition of Mathew Mabin be not granted

That they have considered the same and find that the evidence Produced by the said Mathew Mabin are satisfactory as to the services rendered by him during the war aforesaid and are also satisfied that the said Services have entitled him to such compensation as was bestowed upon the rest of the Company to which he belonged – In consequence of which we recommend that the Comptroller General do ascertain whether the said Mathew Mabin has ever been paid the amount of said Compensation and report the same in a special memo [?] at the next Session of the Legislature
