[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indcipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

To the Honorable the Members of the Assembly now sitting in Columbia

The humble Petition by William Daniel [text too faint to discern] that this State is justly indebted to your petitioner in the sum of forty-eight Pounds fifteen Shillings Sterling for service rendered to this state by your petitioner during the time the British Troops were in possession thereof as by the attested account annexed<sup>2</sup> will more fully appear: and that your petitioner did agreeable to the orders of the Auditor General make a return of his account in due time to Colonel Thomas Taylor who commanded the Troops in which your petitioner had the honor to serve: receiving a promise from the said Colonel Taylor that he would procure the reward to which your petitioner is entitled; that [text too faint to discern] the said Colonel Taylor the said account has never been returned, and thereby petitioner has been prevented getting the reward to which he humbly conceives he is entitled: your petitioner therefore humbly prays that your honors will take his case into consideration and grant him such relief as in your wisdom you think fit, and your petitioner will pray &c

Recommend that the Auditor be directed to audit the same and that Mr. Daniel receive [?] an Indent for the Amount thereof to wit £48.15

[Note: Bobby Gilmer Moss. *Roster of South Carolina Patriots in the American Revolution*. Baltimore: Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc., 1983, p 920 contains the following information regarding Thomas Taylor:

*Born: 10 September 1743, Amelia County, Virginia*

*Died: 16 November 1833*

*Married: Anne Wyche, 2 January 1767*

*After moving to South Carolina during 1754, he first served under Captain Eli Kershaw. He rose to the rank of Captain in the Third Regiment before resigning in October 1777. On 1 December 1780, he became a Colonel and served under Sumter [Thomas Sumter] until 29 September 1781. From March to July 1782, he was under Colonel Henderson [William Henderson] and was in the battles of Hanging Rock [August 6, 1780] and Fort Cary. He was wounded and captured at Fishing Creek [August 18, 1780]. He and his brother escaped and went to North Carolina. He was also in the battles of Orangeburg, Four Holes, the Forks of the Edisto, Fish Dam Ford, Fort Granby, Thomson's Fort, Wright's Bluff, Lynches Creek and Quinby Bridge.”]*
