
[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Muskingum County State of Ohio: Sct. Be it known, that before me in the County aforesaid personally appeared John Ramey [sic] a citizen of the United States and made oath, that he is a resident citizen of this State – that he served as a private soldier in the Revolutionary War against Great Britain – that he enlisted on or about the month of March 1776 for one-year on the Continental establishment in the company commanded by Captain John Gillison, in the 10th Regiment, Virginia line – that he was discharged at the expiration of the one-year as aforesaid at Middlebrook in the State of Jersey on or about the 27th of March 1777 by a written discharge from Captain Gillison, which has long since been lost: – that afterwards he was drafted in the militia of Colonel James Pendleton of Culpeper County Virginia, & served in Captain Grigsby's Company, 3rd Regiment Virginia line for the term of two months. That he was discharged near Richmond at the expiration of his time as aforesaid by the Captain as aforesaid by a written discharge which is also been lost – that he is now in his 64th year of his age – that he has no other evidence to offer, excepting his own statement – and that in consequence of his reduced circumstances in life he needs the assistance of his country for support.

State of Ohio, Muskingum County SS: Court of common pleas July Term 1821

On this 31st day of July 1821, personally appeared in open Court being a Court of record for said state John Remy aged 68 years, resident in Muskingum County in said state, who being 1st duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War on the Continental establishment, as follows: In the him 4th Regiment, commanded by Green & Muhlenburgh [Peter Muhlenberg] in Captain Gillison's Company in the Virginia line. The date of my original application is 1st May 1818 and the number of my pension certificate is 14,485 – And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled “an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war” passed on the 18th day of

private for one-year in the Virginia Continental line. His widow was pensioned at the rate of \$80 per annum commencing March 4th, 1848.]
