
The deposition of Boling Rogers of said county aged about seventy one years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath states That he thinks it was on the 15<sup>th</sup> day of July in the year 1778, in the county of Henrico in the state of Virginia in the company commanded by Capt Joseph Scott in Colo William Davis's regiment in the line of the state of Virginia, on continental establishment in the — regiment he enlisted to serve in the revolutionary war for and during the same that he was not engaged in any of the memorable Battles of the Revolution, but was in many skirmishes he continued to serve as a soldier until peace was declared and was discharged at Charleston in South Carolina, he was in the Battle of York Town at the time Cornwallis was captured. In witness whereof he hath hereunto set his hand & seal this 20<sup>th</sup> day of February 1834.

State of Virginia, Montgomery County to wit [7 April 1834]

This day John Emmons [S46440] of said county personally appeared before me a Justice of the peace in and for said county, and being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath state that he was with Boling Rogers in the service of the United States in the Revolutionary war, they were together in the State of Georgia & South Carolina, that they were also together in the state of Virginia, having both enlisted in Virginia, but under different officers, that the said Boling Rogers continued in the service until the close of the war, and that he is the same individual who is now making application for his pay, which is due to him for his services from the Government of Virginia, and the united States.



Virginia Montgomery County Sct. [9 April 1834]

This day John Miles [VAS4020] personally appeared before me, a Justice of the peace in and for said county, and being first duly sworn, doth on his oath state that him and Boling Rogers were together as soldiers in the service of the United States, for a considerable time, that they were taken prisoners and were confined together for several months at Charlestown S.C. that they were exchanged, that he verily believes that the said Boling Rogers continued in the service until the close of the war, that he is the identical person who is now making application to the government of Virginia and the United States for his pay, as a soldier, that they were both in the regular service. NOTES:

A size roll of noncommissioned officers and privates taken at Chesterfield Courthouse lists the following: Bolin Rogers, age 15, height 5' 6½", black hair, grey eyes, dark complexion, farmer, residing in Henrico County, born in Charles City County where he enlisted on 15 Sep 1780 for the duration of the war, sized on 18 Mar 1781.

On 27 Feb 1849 in Montgomery County VA Naomi Rogers, 75 on the following 27 Oct, applied for a pension stating that she had married Boling (AKA Boldwing) Rogers on 8 Feb 1798, and that he died 25 Nov 1841. The file includes a copy of a bond signed by Bowling Rogers and Moses Winters[?] on 8 Feb 1798 in Montgomery County for the marriage of Rogers to Naomi Burk. Another document states that in 1866 Naomi Rogers was living in Montgomery County with her son-in-law, Philip Woolwine.
