Pension application of Philip Lambly (Lamley) W4712 Elizabeth Lambly f20NC Transcribed by Will Graves 10/10/08: rev'd 5/13/16

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Davidson County

On this 26th day of January 1845 personally appeared before me Jesse Gallimore one of the acting Magistrates in and for Davidson County Joseph Northern<sup>1</sup> a resident of the County in State aforesaid, then United States Pensioner and made oath in due form of law, that he was in the days of the Revolution well acquainted with Philip Lambley [sic] late deceased of Rowan County North Carolina whose son Moses, a resident citizen of said County, is applying for a Pension due his mother (deceased) on that account of the Revolutionary Services of his father the aforesaid Philip Lambley deceased and knows of his own personal knowledge, that the said Philip Lambley was a private soldier in the North Carolina Continental line and as such he served the United States. That he deponent was a private Soldier in Captain Hadley's [Joshua Hadley's] Company of the North Carolina Line and was in the service with the aforesaid Philip Lambley who was a private Soldier in Captain Sharpe's [Anthony Sharpe's] Company of the 10th Regiment, <sup>2</sup> and Enlisted in the year 1782 for 18 months, that they were in the service together at the High Hills, South Carolina, at the Four hole Springs, and near Charleston where they remained for some time until the War ended & the Army was disbanded and they all paroled home by orders of General Green [Nathanael Greene] their Commanding Officer. And this deponent further stated on his said oath, that the aforesaid Philip Lambley was hired by a class to enlist into the 18 months service and that he entered the service in the summer of 1782, and remained in the Army till the War was ended furthermore this deponent saith not.

On this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of February 1845 personally appeared before the Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions for said County Moses Lambly [sic], son of Philip Lembly [sic] deceased, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress passed July 7<sup>th</sup>, 1838 Granting Pensions to certain Widows.

That this declarant the aforesaid Moses Lamly [sic] states that his father Philip Lambly was a private Soldier in Captain Sharp's [Anthony Sharpe's] Company of the Continental Line of this State in the Revolutionary War, as he has always understood, that he was enlisted into the 18 months Service and served about twelve months which was till the end of the War, that he lived when he entered the service in Rowan County North Carolina and was discharged or at least paroled from the service at Charleston in 1783 to go Home there [to] remain till called into the Service which was the End of the War,

This declarant further states that said Philip Lambley [sic] was married to Elizabeth Kasker [?] in Rowan County in the year 1784 and as husband & wife they lived together till the death of Philip Lambley who died on the 23<sup>rd</sup> day of December 1807 and that his widow the aforesaid Elizabeth departed this life on the 20<sup>th</sup> day of March 1842, that the aforesaid Elizabeth did not intermarry after the death of her said husband the aforesaid Philip Lambly but remained his widow until her death. And this declarant further states that he is a resident of Rowan County & State aforesaid aged 38 years: Sworn and subscribed the day & year aforesaid before the court. Test S/ Jno. Giles

I William Hill, Secretary of State, in and for the State of North Carolina, do hereby certify that it appears from the muster-rolls of the Continental line of this State in the Revolutionary War, that Philip Lambley [sic] a private Soldier in Captain Sharpe's [Anthony Sharpe's] Company of the 10<sup>th</sup> Regiment entered the service on the \_\_ day of \_\_\_ 1782 for the term of eighteen months and that he received as one of the eighteen months [men] for 1782 on settlement, the sum of seventy-six dollars sixty (\$76.60).

State of North Carolina Rowan County

On this 23<sup>rd</sup> day of October 1845 personally appeared before me B. Crowell one of the acting Magistrates in & for said County, Moses Lamly [sic], a resident of the County & State aforesaid, the son of Philip Lemly [sic] & wife Elizabeth, both deceased, and an applicant for a pension due the aforesaid Elizabeth Lemby [sic] deceased as the wife & widow of said Philip Lembly [sic] deceased. That this affiant has now in his possession the old family Bible of the aforesaid parties containing a record of the ages of their oldest and first children which record is written in German and is as follows: "Catherine was born 2 February 1787, Elizabeth was born 2 December 1789."

That the above he believes to be a true Record of the ages of his to Eldest sisters Children of his parents the parties aforesaid and that it appears in the handwriting of \_\_ and the original is hereto appended – Sworn to & subscribed on the day & year aforesaid before me.



[Veteran's widow's heirs were granted a pension in her right at the amount of \$38.30 per annum commencing March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1836 and ending March 4, 1842, when she died. The amount of the pension was based upon the service of the veteran in the North Carolina Continental line as a private for 11 months and 15 days.]
