Singletary, Joseph

His name appears on a list of applicants for invalid pension returned by the District Court for the District of Kentucky, North Carolina, and South Carolina, submitted to the House of Representatives by the Secretary of War on April 25, 1794, and printed in the American State Papers, class 9, page 105.

Rank: Lieutenant, N. Carolina militia

Disability: Wounded in the left arm by the accidental discharge of a musket while in the actual line of his duty, in the service of the United States; that for near two years he continued languishing under the wound, and that, by the effects of it, and from no other cause, the arm is withered, the joint of the elbow crooked and stiff, and the fingers of the left hand contracted.

When and where disabled: 1776, Wilmington.

Residence County of Bladen

To what pension entitled: Full pension.

Remarks: There are no militia rolls in this office.

Evidence transmitted by the District Court perfect.
